# Letter from our CEO



At a staff meeting a few weeks ago, I told the story about what happened when we bought an aquarium years ago for our boys. At the pet store, we purchased two types of fish: silver dollars and tiger barbs. We put them in the tank, and enjoyed watching them swim in their schools. Then, we began to notice the silver dollars were not swimming as well. They were losing their equilibrium. More and more of the edges of their bodies were disappearing each day. We then realized the tiger barbs were nibbling away at the silver dollars! Eventually, the silver dollars just tipped over and died. We ended up getting rid of the tiger barbs and purchasing more silver dollars. They could not mutually exist in the same tank.

I told this story to illustrate a disturbing point. All nonprofits are facing serious challenges right now, but as CFR settles in to 2011 and looks ahead to 2012, we are experiencing an alarming “nibbling away at the edges” in budget cuts from our core funding sources. We need to find alternate sources of funding and support from our community to offset this “nibbling” from our core.

Over the years, federal grants and allocations from United Way have helped pay for the rent and utility assistance we provide, as well as for employment education and housing services. Since those grants do not cover general administrative costs, we have depended on funding from Cobb County, along with private donations, to help make up the difference.

We now know our funding from the County will be cut and the budget crises at the state and federal levels will certainly have a negative effect as well. United Way funding has also decreased – nearly 35 percent over the past five years. Our federal grants have become more restrictive, requiring more and more matching dollars from the private sector. Private donations are flat though, due to the Great Recession. Nibble, nibble, nibble!

To conservatively prepare for 2011, we regretfully cut more staff in the last quarter of 2010.

This was a difficult decision, and it has been hard on everyone. Despite all of this, CFR still helped hundreds of families get back on their feet and avoid homelessness.

We leveraged stimulus dollars in 2010 through two different programs to actually serve more families than the prior year. In total for 2010, we served 642 families with \$956,900. While requests for assistance were more than \$5 million, we are thankful to have provided what we could.

The Mansour Center continues to be a vital part of supporting our mission, as those rental and catering fees are an important revenue stream for us. Last year’s income from the Mansour Center was nearly \$200,000. We are grateful to our largest rental customers from 2010, including Lockheed Martin, Action Coach, Stamp Dealers Association, and the State of Georgia. We were also honored to bring the annual Wells Fargo Day of Giving luncheon back for the second year, and the Good Friday Breakfast for John Wieland Homes for the third consecutive year.

In May of 2010, we were honored to host one of our founders, Mr. Fred Bentley, Sr., as well as the family of our first executive director, Flo Beddingfield, at our 50th anniversary dinner. The room was full of faces that have supported this organization for so many years and the event allowed everyone the opportunity to celebrate our history.

CFR’s 2010 Thanks for Giving food distribution program was supported by 160 food drives and brought in more than 70,000 food items, valued at \$134,000, for distribution. Nearly 400 volunteers gave their time and energy to sort, box and distribute the food. We also raised \$68,000 as part of the effort, ensuring each family received a \$15 grocery gift card with their food box. We are so grateful for the local schools, businesses, volunteers, individuals and civic organizations that helped make it such a success.

In December, we were thrilled to celebrate yet another milestone year for the GED program, with 38 graduates. A grant from the Comcast Foundation in support of the GED program also helped us present the “Student of the Year Award” to Shaleesha, whose four sons were there to share in her celebration. Shaleesha is now pursuing a degree in psychology.

It is hard to believe that our 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary year has come and gone. CFR remains committed to breaking the cycle of poverty, and is working harder than ever before. However, to stay ahead of the “nibbles,” we need the continued support from friends like you. We cannot lose our equilibrium. There are just too many people in need.

## Securing Futures

On Saturday, February 27, the CFR Mentoring Program hosted "The High Cost of Not Graduating High School: Life Skills for Teens," a money management activity for mentors and mentees as part of Saturday Academy. Geared toward teaching participants about the cost of living, the activity guided each mentee through a month of expenses on a salary of \$19,000 per year, the average salary for an individual without a high school diploma.

Armed with their own "checkbook," each mentee deposited a bi-weekly paycheck of \$564.62 and were required to visit stations for housing, utilities, transportation and food first. Optional stations included mobile phone service, credit cards, entertainment and a pay day lender.

CFR mentors manned each station as mentees spent their paychecks and recorded each purchase in their checkbook register. The expenses at each station were representative of average costs of monthly bills including a one-bedroom apartment for \$518, utilities at \$180, food for \$175, cable and internet for \$100, and costs for transportation and upkeep based on a car purchase or use of mass transportation.

At the end of the activity, mentees were able to see the difficult, if not impossible, task of surviving on \$19,000 per year.

The CFR Mentoring Program matches disadvantaged youth, ages 11 to 18, with a caring adult mentor. Youth participants are referred by counselors from Cobb County schools and by case managers in the CFR Housing Services Program. Mentors and mentees meet one-on-one or in group settings and participate in a variety of social and educational activities. Enrichment activities are offered the second Saturday of each month and tutoring occurs each Wednesday evening during the school year.

## GED Program

On Tuesday, December 7, the CFR GED Program celebrated as 38 of its graduates received their GED as part of the Cobb Literacy Council's graduation ceremony. In 2010, CFR received a grant in support of the GED program from the Comcast Foundation, a year-round partner of the organization.

The ceremony marked a successful year for the Cobb Literacy Council, as all five accredited sites celebrated a total of 49 graduates. The five accredited sites include CFR, CobbWorks, The Extension, South Cobb Recreation Center and South Cobb Library.

Started in 1991, the CFR program offers GED preparatory courses in one-on-one and small group settings. The sessions partner skilled volunteers with individuals as they take practice tests and refine their test-taking skills.

The CFR program is unique in that individuals attending have access to free childcare. In addition, flexible scheduling accommodates

nontraditional students who may not be able to attend classes during the day. Since its inception, the CFR program has graduated nearly 250 graduates.

The GED Program operates as part of CFR's Employment/Education Services Program. A key component for attaining and maintaining family self-sufficiency is having the necessary skills to earn a sustainable income and plan for the future. CFR provides a variety of program to assist with successful employment skills, including GED preparation, employment readiness and life skills training.

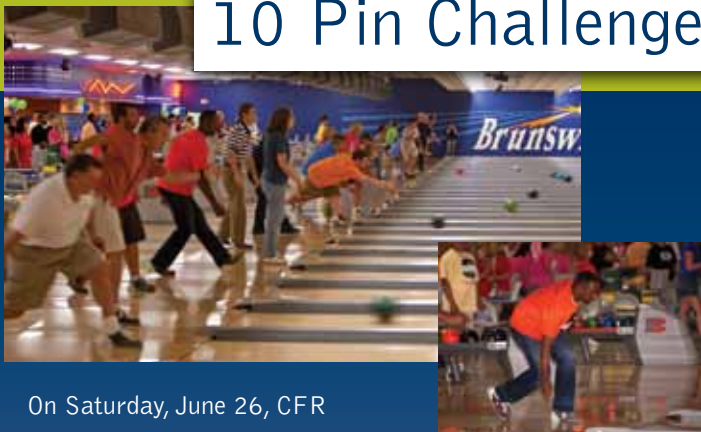

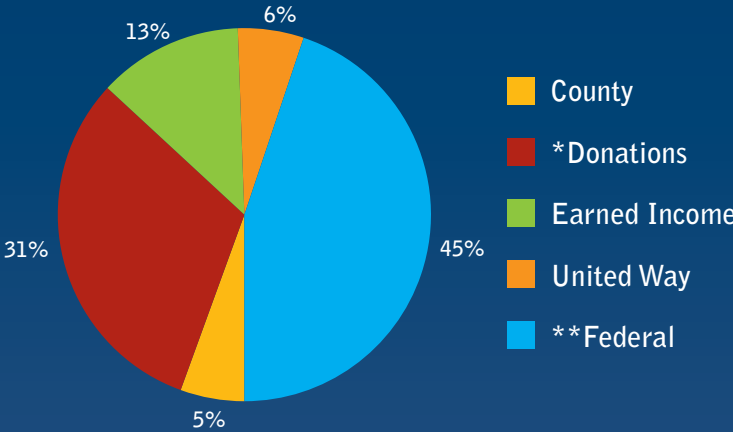

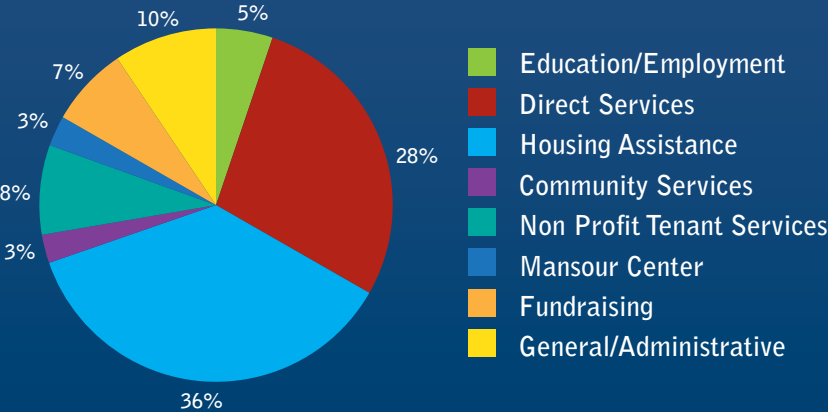
## Sources of Revenue \$3,963,541

## 2010 at a glance ...

**In 2010, The Center for Family Resources received more than 12,750 requests for assistance, with more than \$5,080,900 in requests for rent and utilities.**

### CFR stabilized families by:

- Providing 436 families with rent, utilities, transportation and prescriptions totaling more than \$366,900
- Feeding 1,955 households (5,596 people) with food from the food pantry
- Providing Thanksgiving food boxes to nearly 1,300 households with \$127,140 worth of donated food items and \$19,500 worth of \$15 grocery gift cards
- Assisting 162 families with nearly \$300,000 in rent/mortgage and utilities through the "Fresh Start" program
- Assisting 44 families with \$209,093 in rent and utilities through the Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing (HPRP) program

### CFR empowered lives by:

- Housing 73 families (205 persons) through the Short-Term and Transitional Housing Programs
  - 99 percent of participants achieved at least one housing or employment-related goal
  - 74 percent of families exited successfully to permanent housing

### CFR secured futures by:

- Providing 87 individuals with résumé assistance, job search techniques and interview preparation through the Job Lab
- Providing life skills training to 67 individuals
- Providing 5+ hours of training to 176 GED students
- Celebrating the graduation of 38 GED students
- Matching 19 youth with a caring adult member through the Mentoring Program
  - 82 percent of youth participants gained a new skill
  - 89 percent of youth participants increased their developmental assets
